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campari & orange granita

serves 6

Granita is perfect after a big dinner, because it's a light and refreshing dessert that's so easy to make. Campari and orange juice is one of my favorite drinks, so I thought, Why not make it into a granita? It's a little sweet and a little bitter—and definitely just for grown-ups!

1 cup sugar
3 cups freshly squeezed orange juice (6 to 8 oranges)
1 cup Campari
¼ cup freshly squeezed lemon juice

For the sugar syrup, combine the sugar and 1 cup water in a small saucepan, bring to a boil, and cook just until the sugar is dissolved.

Pour the sugar syrup into a 10 × 13 × 2-inch ceramic (non-metal) dish and stir in the orange juice, Campari, and lemon juice. Place the dish on a level surface in the freezer and freeze for one hour. Rake the entire mixture, including the edges, with the tines of a dinner fork and freeze for another 30 minutes. Continue raking and freezing the granita every 30 minutes, until it's firm and granular. It should take 2 to 3 hours total. The granita is best served within a few hours. Spoon the granita into pretty bowls or stemmed martini glasses and serve frozen.

Pro tip

If the granita freezes too hard, you can always defrost and refreeze it again.
